The Passover


- It commemorates the Israelites' deliverance from slavery in Egypt, as recorded in the Book of Exodus. This feast is rich in symbolism and holds profound theological significance within the **Judeo-Christian** tradition. The origins of Passover are found in the Book of Exodus (Google).
- Is today the Christians Passover?


The Passover

- The Christian Passover – no New Testament authorization
- Eostre, also known as Ostara, was a Germanic goddess of spring. She was associated with the dawn, the spring equinox, and new beginnings. The English word "Easter" is believed to be derived from her name, Eostre (Google).

The Passover

- The word "Easter" is only mentioned once in the King James Version of the Bible, in Acts 12:4. However, it's considered a mistranslation, as most other versions, including the New King James Version, translate it as "Passover". The Greek word "pascha," which the King James Version translates as "Easter," actually refers to the Jewish Passover (Google).
- Passover is mentioned under the Old Law, in the Gospel's – Matthew 26:2; Mark 14:1
- The Gospel's record Jesus' life – He was physically alive under the Old Law

Remembrance

- The Passover was a remembrance, but **NOT** of Jesus' death. Consider the context - Exodus 11/12
- Contrast with - 1 Corinthians 15:13-21 
- By His resurrection, Jesus is proven to be the Son of God - Romans 1:3-4
- Without the resurrection of Jesus, we have no salvation, no assurance of our resurrection, and only destruction after Judgment - Romans 4:25 & 8:11, 1 Corinthians 6:14, 2 Corinthians 4:14, 1 Peter 3:21

Remembrance

- Christians remember Jesus' death and resurrection each Lord's Day in worship –
- 1 Corinthians 11:18, 22-26
- Acts 20:7
- 1 Corinthians 16:1
